2/24 Battalion Reunion "Wangaratta's Own"

On the League's behalf, I had the pleasure of attending the annual reunion of the 2/24 Battalion Association at Wangaratta on November 8. Nine original members of the battalion were in attendance. The Battalion Association meets every year in Wangaratta in November for three days. The activities commenced with a wreath laying service at the Battalion Memorial within the Wangaratta Cemetery. The memorial wall is very impressive, but is very sobering when you see how many names are included on the nominal roll and the names of those who have since passed on.

That evening I attended a reception hosted by the City of Wangaratta and then a dinner at which I gave a short address. I had the privilege of proposing the Toast to the Battalion. Although I had to leave early on the Sunday morning, the Association held a service at 11am at the Cenotaph and finished the weekend's reunion with a BBQ.

The battalion was initially formed in 1940 as part of the 7th Australian Division. The battalion left Australia for Palestine and saw service in North Africa with the defence of Tobruk, the salient at Tel el Eisa, El Alamein and from 1943 in the areas of Nadzab, Finch Haven, Warreo and finally at Tarrakan, where they remained until the end of the war. Their regimental colours register this and are only exceeded by one other battalion who served during the World War II - the 2/25, who have an additional campaign.

The campaigns the 2/24 were involved with will long be remembered in the annals of Australia's military history and I doubt whether we will ever see a generation of Australians quite like this group of men. It was a wonderful and moving day and I was proud to represent the RSL on this occasion.

5 out of 4 Australians have trouble with fractions.

Some people grow up and spread cheer;

others just grow up and spread.

I received copies of this article from two Association members, Alan Nicholson, our Vice President and N. H. 'Moggie' Mogridge.

Moggie writes that the article on Arthur Fitzpatrick appeared in the Gippsland Weekly in April. He says Arthur was the Lieutenant of 13 Platoon, 'C' Company of which he was a member.

A Tale from a Tobruk Rat

Arthur Fitzpatrick lives in Heyfield. Now at 93 years old, his house is tidy, and his demeanour is bright. Life seems relatively simple.

He owns a small wooden box, filled with photos and postcards – most of them yellowing with age. Seated in front of the box, Arthur sorts through a few photos before pulling out a photo of a man in his prime, wearing an Army uniform, slouch hat to one side, standing at ease. On the back in delicate copperplate handwriting is 'L Cpl A Fitzpatrick, 1940' and in darker, newer ink beneath, 'Sergeant A Ftzpatrick'.

For it was in 1940 that Arthur, at the age of 24 and a lust for adventure, joined the Australian Army.

"Everybody was joining the Army", he recalls. "All my mates were joining, and it was like an adventure. At least it was for me".

Arthur was a member of the $2/24^{th}$ Infantry Battalion. Raised in Wangaratta in 1940, the $2/24^{th}$ was part of the 7th Division, which, in the November of 1940, was shipped to the Middle East. The 7th Division was initially stationed in Dirma, in Palestine, before being sent to relieve the 6th Division at Tobruk in Lybia on April 10, 1941.

By then, elements of the 7th Division had been consolidated with the 9th and was settling in for the long haul. Arthur, along with the rest of the 9th Division remained there for the next six months fighting off the German Afrika Korps.

Although outnumbered and outgunned, Tobruk became the first battle in which the seemingly all-powerful German forces were repelled. The situation in Tobruk was unforgiving to the troops, who were ordered to hold off the German advance from the already battered waterfront fortress.

"There was this large circle of pits. All the Rats in Tobruk were prepared to hold it," Arthur said of the grit of the Allied forces in Tobruk. And it was within those pits that the famous name was born, the Rats of Tobruk.

The advantage lay with the Allies, as Tobruk was surrounded by an almost completely flat plateau, with no cover for attacking forces. The harbour served as the heart of the fortress, with the defences crossing the desert in a rough semi-circle to the western harbour, nine miles away. Strong points were littered across the desert, protected by barb wire, anti-tank ditches and land mines.

It was on this setting that the Afrika Korps launched an attack on April 13, 1941, known as the Easter Battle. Expecting to take Tobruk with ease, the Germans ended up being completely routed by the Allies.

"We managed to withstand the attacks, until we withdrew in November, 1941," Arthur said of the attacks from the Germans. "We didn't have much in the way of arms. Of course, you couldn't lift your head up over the pits during the day or you'd lose it"

After months of holding off the Germans, the 9th Division was withdrawn out of Tobruk. Arthur was shipped out on September 17, 1941, aboard the HMAS Nizam. However the voyage was marred by tragedy and was the last journey for some of Arthur's comrades. The Nizam, while maneuvering to avoid torpedoes, barely avoided a bomb and her oil pumps were damaged.

"Thirteen blokes were lost over the side, and only eight survived, having been in Tobruk for all that time."

Looking back over the effort in Tobruk, Arthur believes the effort the Australian troops put in was instrumental in routing the Germans.

"It was a pretty good effort as far as Australia was concerned, to have held the place and the garrison from the Germans from April until November."

Now, although nearly seventy years have passed since Tobruk, Arthur still remembers the events like yesterday.

"I often think about various blokes and incidents at night, wishing I had done this better, or thinking that I did that all right. A lot of them (his comrades) are not with us anymore. At 93, I'm one of the lucky ones".

The following, kindly forwarded by Jim Lowe of Natimuk, VIC, is a Newspaper article from the Argus, dated May 8th 1945.

Australians capture Tarakan Airstrip – Victorian Battalion in thick of fight.

From Noel Adams, War correspondent of the Argus, with the Australians in Borneo.

Two main goals of the Australian invasion of Tarakan have been reached after five days of heavy and incessant fighting. The town and the airstrip are entirely in our hands.

Enemy positions adjacent to the airfield have been eliminated, and repair of the runway is in progress. Surprisingly the Japanese, who had clung fiercely to their strong defences on Ripon Ridge, overlooking the airstrip, withdrew on Friday night, and on Saturday afternoon the ridge was occupied by our troops without opposition.

A Victorian battalion which bore the brunt of the fighting for the strip hoisted the Australian flag and its own battalion flag on the strip shortly after 6pm.

While Ripon Ridge was being occupied cavalry commandos and pioneers completed the clearance of Tarakan, blowing in the few remaining tunnels from which the Japanese attempted to defend the town and its surrounding oilfield.

With the capture of the town and the airstrip the main phase of the battle for the island has ended. The Japanese forces that still remain are no longer in a position to deny us the use of the island.

The tenacity with which the Japanese defended the airstrip from their deep tunnels and pillboxes on Ripon Ridge made it appear that they were determined to hold the ridge to the last man. But when two Australian patrols moved across the airstrip on Saturday afternoon from either end and climbed the ridge they found it deserted. Another patrol then pushed along the road from the airstrip in the direction of the island's other oilfield, which lies roughly in the centre of Tarakan, and did not encounter any opposition until it reached a height known as Gaps, more than half a mile to the north.

That night the troops who had won the air strip enjoyed their first night's unbroken rest since they landed on the island at dawn on Tuesday. They forgot their weariness, their sweat-sodden clothes, and unshaven faces, in the cheer they gave as they watched the Australian flag and their own battalion emblem being hoisted over the strip. While Ripon Ridge was being occupied engineers of the Army and RAAF began clearing the airstrip of the mines with which had been sown by the Japanese. They began their dangerous work even before they knew that the ridge was cleared. Before nightfall they had unearthed a number of powerful mines, including not only converted depth charges, which the Japanese have left everywhere, but Dutch naval mines filled with 5001b of high explosive.

In the town area the men of a South Australian battalion moved through the eastern outskirts, which they had occupied on Friday and after clearing several Japanese positions from a commanding ridge cut the road running from the town to a small beach on the east coast of the island. It was while this operation was in progress that commandos who captured Tarakan Hill on Friday cleared the hill, with the aid of pioneers, of the last enemy nests. Together these two actions put the town completely in our possession.

There have been many tense and dramatic encounters during the fighting on Tarakan. On most of the ridges so thick is the undergrowth that our own men and enemy patrols have sometimes come face to face before either was aware of the other's presence.

During the attack on the airstrip Pte Ron Tully, of Geelong, was patrolling in thick scrub when a few yards away he saw a helmeted figure with his back turned towards him. Thinking it was an American looking for excitement, Tully called out, "Good-day, Yank." The man turned swiftly, and Tully saw that he was a Japanese with a grenade in each hand. Tully recovered in an instant from his surprise and shot the Japanese before he could even raise his hand.

GENERAL BLAMEY'S CONGRATULATIONS

The officer commanding the Australian troops on Tarakan has received the following message of congratulation from General Blarney, C-in-C AMF: "Warm congratulations on successful operation which leads AIF again from Australian territory to foreign territory held by the common enemy." The message' expresses appreciation of the efforts of all the forces engaged in the

operation.

It was announced from General Blarney's headquarters that the Tarakan invasion operations were carried out under the general direction of Major-General G. F. Wooten, commanding 9th Australian Division, in co-operation with Admiral Royal, US Navy, and Air Vice-Marshal Bostock, RAAF.

The force which made the assault landing was under the command of Brigadier D A Whitehead.

Here is my involvement regarding this story – to lead my section to capture the ridge overlooking the air field and the twin barreled anti-aircraft gun.

Captain Traves had taken out pill boxes with accurate fire. At day break Lt. Harry Freame and I had surveyed the gun position and this helped when my section was ordered to take the position – no casualties. Ron Tully's story is very accurate. Ron was in my section.

A *Dedication Service* to remember and honour the service and sacrifice of the Unit will be held at the Memorial in Canberra to install the Plaque.
